Mother, wife, daughter, sister, PhD student... Salma gracefully juggles her multiple roles, embodying the power of family, resilience, and faith.

hen she arrives for our first meeting, Salma is exactly as she will be in all the subsequent ones: warm, generous, enthusiastic, and sensitive. After only a few minutes of conversation, she wipes away tears as she talks about her son. «I am emotional,» she explains. Originally from Marrakech, where she joins her husband and son on weekends, this young woman in her thirties is in her second year of a PhD in the Agro-Biosciences department. She wears many hats. What allows her to manage her various roles is her passion: "I've always been fascinated by how science can help farmers become more resilient to climate challenges," she says. Her commitment to agriculture is evident through the numerous internships and jobs she's held, supporting farmers in rural and mountainous regions. After a brief stint in the agro-food industry, she

lands a job as a medical delegate. Salma, who once saw herself as a "100% scientist," discovers in herself extraordinary, untapped talents for marketing and sales. Salma, who initially didn't even have her driver's license travels across the country, surpasses her objectives, and forms almost familial bonds with her colleagues. "The contact with people was always very pleasant, and I put my heart into this job. But then... there was this dream that haunted me: Salma, you need a PhD!"

It was this dream that drove her to take the next step. In 2017, a distant relative tells her about UM6P. Intrigued and full of hope, she decides to take a chance.
